

a. Stockton Police Department-Chief Romney Last month we had- 43 Traffic stops, 34 cases, 3 County cases, and 7 call outs. There were no use of force incidents.

Major crimes: 1. On January 22, 2019 while running the radar on Connor Ave, Chief Romney observed a passenger vehicle going 84 in a 40 MPH zone. Chief Romney was on the North side of Town. The vehicle proceeded at that high rate of speed through the entire Town without slowing down. As Chief Romney turned to pull the vehicle over, he watched as the vehicle weaved into oncoming traffic, then cut off a school bus full of children. Chief Romney had to go 125 MPH to catch the vehicle which stopped in front of the Army Depot. The driver was arrested for reckless driving and his vehicle was impounded. He said he was late for Court. 2. Had a 23 year old male go into the gas station's bathroom and use methamphetamine. He is a resident of the Townsof Stockton, who had been doing this over the last several weeks. Due to some watchful store clerks, we were able to catch him in the act. He was arrested and trespassed from the gas station.

Nuisances: 1. People parking on the road, hindering plowing and causing traffic issues. Community events: 1. Special thanks to Samuel Memmott, as an Eagle Scout Project helped us finish cleaning out and organizing the downstairs and making some much needed repairs and modifications.

b. Stockton Fire Department-Chief Huffman/Assistant Chief Thatcher Chief Huffman-Last month we had 15 calls. 4 fires, 2 rescues, and 9 medicals. 5-6 of those calls were in Town. There were 2 structure fires in Rush Valley, this last month. We were able to go to Winter Fire School in St. George in January. The Fire Department is preparing for Reginal Fire School at the Army Depot in April, it will be really beneficial. Amy Lyman enrolled in her EMP Course, she's moving right along at a quick pace and we appreciate her. Last month Assistant Chief Thatcher asked for money for the pump system on our tender. We don't have a lot left, mostly plumbing left.

ORDINANCE 2019-06

AN ORDINANCE OF STOCKTON TOWN AMENDING STOCKTON TOWN CODE SECTION 10-11-2 REGARDING NON-CONFORMING STRUCTURES.

WHEREAS, Utah Code Section 10-9a-511 governs nonconforming uses and nonconforming structures, and allows the reconstruction of nonconforming structures that have been involuntarily destroyed by fire or other natural calamity (see UCA 10-9a-511 attached as Exhibit A); and,

WHEREAS, as a general proposition, it is appropriate and lawful to update the Stockton Town Code to be consistent with the regulations of the Utah Code; and,

WHEREAS, Stockton Town Code Section 10-11-2(C) governs the ability of a person to rebuild a nonconforming structure that has been involuntarily destroyed by fire or other natural calamity, which Section 10-11-2(C) has not kept pace with the requirements of Utah Code Section 10-9a-511; and,

WHEREAS, the Mayor recommends that Stockton Town Code Section 10-11-2(C) be amended to be consistent with the Utah Code and to allow property owners a greater ability to rebuild nonconforming structures that have been involuntarily destroyed by fire or other natural calamity; and,

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission held a duly-noticed public hearing on March 5, 2019, and recommended approval of this Ordinance 2019-06 to the Town Council; and,

WHEREAS, this ordinance is necessary to protect the public health, safety, and welfare:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE STOCKTON TOWN COUNCIL that Stockton Town Code Section 10-11-2(C) is hereby amended as shown below in the attached Exhibit B.

This Ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace, health, safety, and welfare of Stockton Town and its residents and businesses and shall become effective immediately upon compliance with State law.

Exhibit A

Utah Code Section 10-9a-511

Effective 5/8/2018

10-9a-511 Nonconforming uses and noncomplying structures.

(1)

- (a) Except as provided in this section, a nonconforming use or noncomplying structure may be continued by the present or a future property owner.
- (b) A nonconforming use may be extended through the same building, provided no structural alteration of the building is proposed or made for the purpose of the extension.
- (c) For purposes of this Subsection (1), the addition of a solar energy device to a building is not a structural alteration.

(2) The legislative body may provide for:

- (a) the establishment, restoration, reconstruction, extension, alteration, expansion, or substitution of nonconforming uses upon the terms and conditions set forth in the land use ordinance;
- (b) the termination of all nonconforming uses, except billboards, by providing a formula establishing a reasonable time period during which the owner can recover or amortize the amount of his investment in the nonconforming use, if any; and
- (c) the termination of a nonconforming use due to its abandonment.

(3)

- (a) A municipality may not prohibit the reconstruction or restoration of a noncomplying structure or terminate the nonconforming use of a structure that is involuntarily destroyed in whole or in part due to fire or other calamity unless the structure or use has been abandoned.
- (b) A municipality may prohibit the reconstruction or restoration of a noncomplying structure or terminate the nonconforming use of a structure if:
 - (i) the structure is allowed to deteriorate to a condition that the structure is rendered uninhabitable and is not repaired or restored within six months after the day on which written notice is served to the property owner that the structure is uninhabitable and that the noncomplying structure or nonconforming use will be lost if the structure is not repaired or restored within six months; or
 - (ii) the property owner has voluntarily demolished a majority of the noncomplying structure or the building that houses the nonconforming use.

(c)

- (i) Notwithstanding a prohibition in the municipality's zoning ordinance, a municipality may permit a billboard owner to relocate the billboard within the municipality's boundaries to a location that is mutually acceptable to the municipality and the billboard owner.
- (ii) If the municipality and billboard owner cannot agree to a mutually acceptable location within 180 days after the day on which the owner submits a written request to relocate the billboard, the billboard owner may relocate the billboard in accordance with Subsection 10-9a-513(2).

(4)

- (a) Unless the municipality establishes, by ordinance, a uniform presumption of legal existence for nonconforming uses, the property owner shall have the burden of establishing the legal existence of a noncomplying structure or nonconforming use.
- (b) Any party claiming that a nonconforming use has been abandoned shall have the burden of establishing the abandonment.
- (c) Abandonment may be presumed to have occurred if:
 - (i) a majority of the primary structure associated with the nonconforming use has been voluntarily demolished without prior written agreement with the municipality regarding an extension of the nonconforming use;
 - (ii) the use has been discontinued for a minimum of one year; or

- (iii) the primary structure associated with the nonconforming use remains vacant for a period of one year.
- (d) The property owner may rebut the presumption of abandonment under Subsection (4)(c), and has the burden of establishing that any claimed abandonment under Subsection (4)(b) has not occurred.
- (5) A municipality may terminate the nonconforming status of a school district or charter school use or structure when the property associated with the school district or charter school use or structure ceases to be used for school district or charter school purposes for a period established by ordinance.

Proposed Revisions to Stockton Town Code Section 10-11-2(C)

10-11-2: NON-CONFORMING BUILDINGS OR STRUCTURES:

C.	Damage Or Destruction: . A non-conforming building or structure which is damaged or partially <u>i</u>nvoluntaril y
destro	d in whole or in part due to by fire, flood, wind, earthquake, or other calamity or act of the public enemy, may be reconstructed and restored, and the use of that non-conforming
structu	continued unless the structure or use has been abandoned.
	A structure so destroyed shall be deemed abandoned if reconstruction or restoration

has not lawfully begun within one year of the date of destruction.

3. Reconstruction or restoration of a structure so destroyed is prohibited if the structure is rendered uninhabitable and is not repaired or restored within six months after the day on which written notice is served to the property owner that the structure is uninhabitable and that the nonconforming structure or nonconforming use will be lost if the structure is not repaired or restored within six months from the date of the notice. Service shall be by first-class U.S. mail to the property owner address on file with the Tooele County Recorder.

4. A nonconforming structure shall not be reconstructed or restored if the owner of the structure has voluntarily demolished a majority of the nonconforming structure or the building

that houses the nonconforming use.

The occupancy or use of such building, structure or part thereof which existed at the time of such partial destruction may be continued or resumed; provided, that such restoration is started within a period of one (1) year and is diligently prosecuted to completion within a period of two (2) years. In the event such damage or destruction exceeds three (3) times the assessed value of such non-conforming building or structure, no repairs or reconstruction shall be made, except in the case of residences or accessory buildings, unless every portion of such building or structure is made to conform to all regulations for new buildings in the zone in which it is located, as determined by the Town Engineer and Building Inspector.

ORDINANCE 2019-08

AN ORDINANCE OF STOCKTON TOWN AMENDING STOCKTON TOWN CODE SECTIONS 10-3-5 AND 10-3-6 REGARDING THE USE OF CITY PARKS.

WHEREAS, Stockton Town Code Section 10-3-5 contains the procedures for obtaining a permit to use a town park and the regulations for the use of the park under the permit; and,

WHEREAS, Section 10-3-5(G)(1) prohibits the possession or consumption of any alcoholic beverage in a town park during the permitted activity; and,

WHEREAS, the Mayor recommends that this provision is overly restrictive when it comes to permitted family gatherings and other permitted activities conducted in the parks, and that no public interest will be harmed by allowing park patrons to enjoy a beer with their meal at the park; and,

WHEREAS, Stockton Town Code Section 10-3-6 governs activities prohibited in town parks; and,

WHEREAS, Section 10-3-6(H) prohibits the possession or consumption of any alcoholic beverage in a town park; and,

WHEREAS, for the reasons stated above, the Mayor recommends that this provision is overly restrictive and prohibits otherwise perfectly legal behavior; and,

WHEREAS, concerns regarding drunkenness and other alcohol-related crimes occurring in the town parks are covered by the criminal laws of the State of Utah and Stockton Town, and can be adequately enforced regardless of park permit restrictions; and,

WHEREAS, this ordinance is necessary to protect the public health, safety, convenience, prosperity, morals, and general welfare:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE STOCKTON TOWN COUNCIL that Stockton Town Code Sections 10-3-5 and 10-3-6 are hereby amended as shown in the attached Exhibit A.

This Ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace, health, safety, and welfare of Stockton Town and its residents and businesses and shall become effective immediately upon compliance with State law.

Amendments to Stockton Town Code Sections 10-3-5 and 10-3-6

7-3-5: APPLICATION FOR PERMIT:

A park or recreation permit shall be granted with applicable fees paid, to any person who completes an application therefor, which includes the following information and is filed at the Town office at least ten (10) days prior to the date of anticipated use; provided, that no prior permit for the same facility during conflicting time periods has been issued:

- A. The name, address and phone number of the person or organization wishing to conduct an activity.
- B. The date, time and place the said activity shall be conducted.
- C. The name of the responsible person conducting said activity on behalf of the organization, including the residential address, mailing address and phone number of said person.
- D. If applicable, the business address and mailing address of the sponsoring organization, and its telephone number.
- E. A description of the activity to be conducted.
- F. The hour the activity will commence and terminate.
- G. A statement signed by a representative of the organization or group making application to the effect that the persons responsible will not permit any person attending said facility to:
- 1. Possess or consume any alcoholic beverage upon the park or recreation facility during the activity;
 - 12. Breach any Town ordinance or State law;
- 23. Damage the park, recreation facility or any appurtenances or property used in connection with said park or recreation facility;
- 34. Interfere with any other lawful activity being conducted upon any park or recreation facility;
- 45. Deposit litter, garbage, refuse, wastepaper, cans, bottles or other waste or nuisance material upon said park or recreation facility, except in containers specifically provided for such;
- 56. Engage in any activity which will require the diversion of peace officers to the location of the activity upon a park, recreation facility or property adjacent thereto, other than as required by normal patrol;
- 67. Conduct any activity which is reasonably likely to cause injury to person or property, incite violence, crime or disorderly conduct;
- 78. Conduct any activity which is reasonably likely to interfere or detract from the promotion of public health, welfare, safety and recreation.
- H. Confirm the date of use one (1) week prior to scheduled date of use.
- I. If keys to park areas are needed for the activity, they need to be picked up the day before the event or Friday if the activity is on the weekend. Keys are to be turned in the day after the activity or Monday if the activity is on the weekend.
- J. Cancellations must be received at the Town Hall three (3) working days prior to the reservation date to receive a full refund.
- K. Requests for a refund may be made in writing or by phone and, if a refund is granted, it will be mailed to the person or organization making the reservation. Refunds will not be issued to anyone who fails to cancel reservations as outlined.

7-3-6: RESTRICTIONS TO PARK USE:

It is unlawful for any person to either perform or permit to be performed any of the following acts upon a Town park or recreation facility:

- A. Wilfully mark, deface, disfigure, injure, tamper with or displace or remove any building, bridge, table, bench, fireplace, railing, backstop, sign, notice, monument, stake, post or other appurtenance to said park or recreation facility, including landscaping or garbage containers.
- B. Fail to clean up all debris, extinguish all fires when such are permitted to be built, or leave said premises in good order and neat and sanitary condition.
- C. Throw, discharge or otherwise place or cause to be placed or left in any waters of any fountain, pond, lake, stream or other body or container of water in or adjacent to any park or recreation facility any material or substance which will or may result in the pollution of said water.
- D. Bring in or dump, deposit, leave or cause to be deposited or left anywhere on the grounds of any park or recreation facility any bottles, broken glass, ashes, paper, boxes, cans, dirt, rubbish, waste, garbage, refuse or trash, except in proper receptacles for the same where provided, and if none are provided or the same are already full, failing to carry said items away from the park or recreation facility and properly dispose of the same elsewhere.
- E. Disturb the peace and good order of the Town or other persons lawfully upon the premises of said park or recreation facility.
- F. Endanger the safety of any person by any conduct or act.
- G. Commit any assault or engage in any fight.
- H. Carry, possess or consume any alcoholic beverage in any park or recreation facility.
- H. Drive or park any automobile upon the premises of said park or recreation facility in any place except a properly designated parking area or street.
- L. Paste, glue, tack, post or make any sign or other lettering, advertisement or inscription whatsoever upon any appurtenance or personal property of a park or recreation facility.
- الله. Allow any pets or animals of any kind inside fenced areas of any park or recreation facility, unless said animal is for the purpose of assisting handicapped persons or for law enforcement purposes.
- KL. Allow any motorized vehicle inside fenced areas of any park or recreation facility, unless said motorized vehicle is for the purpose of assisting handicapped persons or is for law enforcement or park maintenance purposes.
